Public Transport & Parking

 By Bus: Services No. 265 and No. 94 serve the A36 and B3108 roads and villages between Bath & Bradford on Avon.
 By Train: First Great Western trains call at Bath, Freshford, Avoncliff and Bradford on Avon stations.

Dundas Aqueduct
 An important and impressive example of industrial architecture, Dundas Aqueduct, named after the first chairman of the Kennet & Avon Canal Co., Charles Dundas, has always been a popular destination for visitors by land and canal. Built by John Rennie, the engineer and architect of the K & A Canal, between 1797 and 1801, the aqueduct has classical design features and was the first canal structure to be designated an Ancient Monument in 1951.
 Refurbishment of the honey coloured stone facing, completed in 2004, enables us to see the aqueduct as it was when first constructed two centuries ago.
